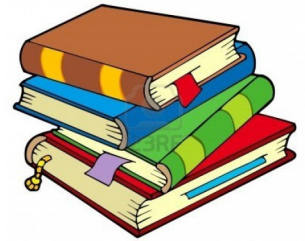

SURNAMES RESEARCHED

In the WCGS library we have a registration notebook, with visitors info going back about ten years. We invite guests to list the surnames of family they research. The beginning pages are an index to the surnames searched for and reference to the person who physically came in to our library and left the info. Following is a list alphabetically of names searched for in recent months: Ames, Aragon, Barnhill, Bondeson, Brewster, Farrington, Freitag, Gabbard, Goff, Goodger, Hayden, Lake, Lane, Libby, Monahan, Peters, Pinnow, Piper, Rogers, Satterfield, Schaffer, Seaborn, Sebourn, Trujillo, Waltz, Walz, Williams, Wolz, Zimbeck. If any name is one researched by you and you have not visited our library, there might be a chance someone else is connecting to your surname. Stop in and check this out. Also just a quick look at a couple of books we have on surnames: "A Dictionary of British Surnames", "Our Italian Surnames", and "The Surnames of Ireland" might be of interest as they show origination of the name, possibly the area its from, and /or the meaning of names, thus giving clues to possible occupations such as the name WHEELER, someone who made wheels.

Lastly, if anyone would like to volunteer to assist guests, come in any Tuesday and talk to who is staffing that day. The rewards of being there and helping let you become familiar with our inventory, its location, assisting guests, and you can make time to do some of your own research. One does not have to research Walworth county as we have many unique books and records from the U.S. and foreign countries as well.

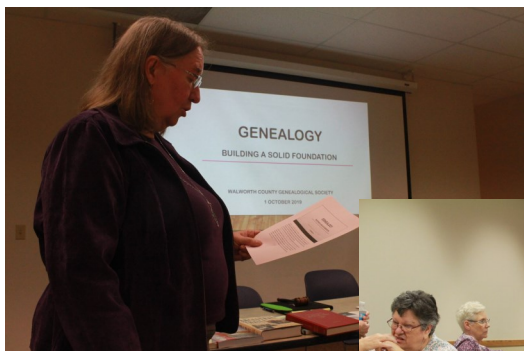

Following the beginning of United States involvement in World War I, all resident aliens who had not been naturalized, were required, as a security measure, to register with the U.S. Marshal nearest their place of residence. A failure to register risked interment or possible deportation. This registration occurred between November 1917 and April 1918.

The British Interest Group of Wisconsin & Illinois (BIGWILL) welcomes Maureen Brady as speaker from 10:00 am to 12:00 noon on Saturday, November 16, 2019 at the Community Church, 5714 Broadway, Richmond, IL 60071.

Maureen's presentation will help us to better understand and use Find My Past, a comprehensive website with an ever-growing list of databases and images for British family history research. She will guide us through some of the most useful resources, various search techniques on the website and a case study of a British soldier of the Napoleonic era.

Maureen Brady, a former school librarian and computer educator, has 35 years experience with family history research. She has traced her own Scottish roots back to the end of the 17th century and beyond, and has also pursued Chicago area research, and the trans-Allegheny U.S., Quebec, Irish and Swedish research. She is the co-director and trainer for the Crystal Lake (IL) Family History Center. Maureen has made numerous presentations to Illinois and Wisconsin genealogical societies, libraries, conferences and workshops, including presenting at the 2002 National Genealogical Society Conference in the States and the 2016, 2017 and 2018 Central Florida Family History Conference.
